RE-CYCLE by Janette Glover-Geidt

The word "re-cycle" was unknown but it is what every household did. In a town where no one was very well off, everything was used and re-used. All large quantities of food arrived in sturdy wooden boxes, perfect for storing things. They made excellent chairs or stools and when stacked were used as shelves for dishes, books or? The smart homeowner could put hinges on the top boards creating a chest or toy box. Cigar boxes stored keepsakes or became jewelry boxes.

Food also arrived in sacks of burlap or cotton. Potato sacks could be used over and over again for storing produce. For traveling, they made duffle bags. Opened up, they could cover bed-springs, or hang as curtains to partition off a room. The uses for flour sacks were legion: tea towels, aprons, underwear, pillow slips, bags for shopping, school or laundry.

"Our underpants had Royal Standard on one leg and Red Rose on the other. They were white as any linen." - Annie (Muschamp) Nelson

"In summer, I went to the hotel, got all the corks from wine bottles, and put them in a flour sack and made water wings." - Nellie (McKay)King

"Lina made all us kids bathing suits, a new one every year. They were easy to make because you just cut a neck out of the bottom of the sack, and a couple of arms out of the corners, and then did a little sewing under the crotch. Big or small, boys or girls, they were very adaptable."- Margaret (Glover) Matthews

Filled with down they made excellent pillows. A 50# sack opened up became a yard of material 36" wide. The 100# sacks were large and could be sewn together to make bed sheets. With lace or crocheted edge, charming curtains, hankies, tablecloths, doilies were created.

Newspapers, few at first, were used for starting fires, wrapping things, lining shelves, insulating walls. They were also used as toilet paper, as well as the old catalogues tied up with a string to the outhouse wall.

Long Joe could not read English but he had the Sunday "Sun" delivered to start his fires. It provided more paper than the "Province". Bill Kelly claimed the "Province" was printed on better quality paper to use as toilet paper. The Sun's paper was to thin and his fingers went right through it.



BILL AND DAPHNE HAMILTON

Both Bill and Daphne were active members of our community for many years. Bill was raised in Union Bay and joined the Air Force during WW2 He served until the end of the war as a parachute packer. He often bragged that he *must have done* an excellent job because no one ever came back and complained. After his service, he returned to Union Bay to his family.



Daphne was a teacher in Cumberland in the early 1950's when she met and later married Bill. They had two children David and Pat. They moved onto Tappin St. in 1960 and lived there until 2013. When their children became school age Daphne began teaching at Union Bay Elementary, then substituting before taking early retirement. She came back every spring to teach the children the Maypole dance for Cumberland's May Day celebration. Daphne also loved her Church and went faithfully every Sunday. She became a very active member in the church choir and the UCW group, assisting in raising money for for our little brown church by holding teas and other fundraisers. She also belonged to the Historical Society where she sang and acted in many of their musicals. Singing was her passion.

Bill was very involved with our Volunteer Fire Department and spent endless hours training, washing, cleaning and maintaining the trucks and hall. After many years of service, he retired as an officer, then volunteered to take the smoke house to schools teaching the children fire safety and how to react to a house fire. Bill then became an honorary fireman and attended Fire Department celebrations. He also worked countless hours on the boat launch committee, collecting money, mowing lawns and setting up our Community Hall for functions. He was mainly responsible for the giant propeller you see at the breakwater. He had remembered back in the coal shipping days a ship had lost its propeller and went on a mission with the help of the Historical Society and friends to retrieve it, restore it and place it where it sits today.

All their volunteer work has provided us with a better community. Their passing has left us with fond memories.
