COMMUNICATIONS: RADIO

After the first World War, people in Union Bay started experimenting with radio. It was not a matter of buying a crystal set; one had to have some electrical knowledge. The radios were bought in parts or kits for about \$25 and put together in many ingenious ways. Jim Murdock was the first to make one at the Bay, when he bought a "Radiola Super-Hetrodyne". He boasted of hearing stations as far away as California but, whenever anyone was invited to share the experience the reception, likely as not, was very poor.

For those not fortunate enough to have a set, "radio concerts" were held by the Northern Radio Co. at a hall in Courtenay. People sat and listened to singers and bands, and even danced to the music.

By the 1930's radio was becoming very popular; everyone was saving to buy a set. Wages were low and radios were over \$100. There were the Majestic, Spartan, Westinghouse and RCA from which to choose from.

In the beginning all the stations received at Union Bay were American and music was about all that was broadcast. The position and size of the antenna dictated the stations received. A station in Victoria claimed to serve all of Vancouver Island but could not be heard past the Malahat. Then in 1936 the CBC station started broadcasting coast to coast and soon had a large following. The next year everyone in town with a radio was up early (London time) on May 12 listening to King George V1's coronation.

Every morning, housewives kept healthy and happy with the "Happy Gang". People became slaves to the "little box" as they hurried home to follow the adventures of "Ma Perkins" or ate lunch to the "Farm Show". Everything stopped on Saturday night for "Hockey Night in Canada" with most of the Bay cheering for the Maple Leafs. The kids got their thrills from the "Lone Ranger" and the "Shadow". Sunday night the family gathered round the radio for "Lux Radio Theatre".

Remember it is volunteers that keep the Community Club up and running.

They constantly:

- keep the building and grounds in good shape
- organize special events such as Union Bay Family Day, Craft Fairs and many more
- keep track of hall and field bookings.







PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT:

Spring is upon us and backyard burning is taking place by the smoke trails in the air and the obvious smoky smell... The members of the Union Bay Fire Rescue would like to remind all residents in the Union Bay Improvement District to be conscious of the two requirements put out by province of BC. This year is already very dry on Vancouver Island as the rain has not been present in the months of February and March. Various Fire Departments have already been actively fighting brush fires already this year. If you don't have to burn please don't, if you do, please follow the requirements of Union Bay Fire Rescue and the Province of British Columbia.

Union Bay Fire Rescue does not issue burn permits but does follow the requirements of the province.

The Members of the UBFR would like the following:

- A responsible person is present while the burn is in progress.
- A charged garden hose is on site and ready for Isolating the burn and or extinguishment.
- Understand the BURNING INDEX set out the province of BC. This will be posted at the bottom of the page. Please save this so access when needed is available. If this in not available via cell phone, Tablet or PC.
- Categories of burns. Yes, there are least 3 categories to understand. They will be posted on the back side of this page. Please understand the requirements on the poster and follow through.

ALL Burns:

- BURNING INDEX, the daily Smoke Control Forecast contains predictions of the Ventilation Index, a measure of atmospheric turbulence and low-level winds, for 25 B.C. locations.
- The Fire District of Union Bay is located in the Central Vancouver Island region which is noted on the Venting Index page as CNTRL VAN ISLD.
- The burning of woody debris outdoors is only permitted when the forecast Ventilation Index is sufficient to disperse smoke. Before debris can be ignited, the Ventilation Index must be predicted to be both GOOD (55-100) this afternoon as well as FAIR or GOOD (34-100) tomorrow afternoon. Additional rules on outdoor burning are in the Open Burning Smoke Control Regulation. Used for Category 2 and 3 fires.

Burning Bans:

Union Bay is under two areas for burn bans: MID ISLAND is Hindoo Creek (south of the rest stop) is to the south. NORTH ISLAND is North of Hindoo Creek. Be Aware of burning bans in your area by Social media, Radio, Newspaper, or Coastal Fire Center Website and follow the requirements given.

Let's Keep Union Bay Safe this season. Be vigilant on your open fires and those of your neighbours.



40% of B.C. wildfires are human-caused and therefore preventable

CAMPFIRES, CATEGORY 2 FIRES AND CATEGORY 3 FIRES: WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?



CAMPFIRE:

Any fire smaller than 0.5 metres high by 0.5 metres wide

REGULATIONS:



You must have ready access to 8 litres of water or a shovel for the entire time your campfire is lit.



Your campfire must be completely extinguished and the ashes must be cool to the touch before leaving the area for any length of time. (Hot coals can reignite the fire.)



During campfire prohibitions, only a CSA- or ULC-approved portable campfire apparatus may be used, and the flame height must not exceed 15 centimetres.



You must build a fire guard around your campfire.

CATEGORY 2 FIRE:

- 1 to 2 concurrently burning piles no larger than 2 metres high by 3 metres wide
- Stubble or grass burning over an area less than 0.2 hectares

REGULATIONS:



A fuel break must be established around any Category 2 burn



Fireworks are banned when a Category 2 fire prohibition is in



Burning barrels are banned when a Category 2 fire prohibition is in effect.



At least one person equipped with a fire-fighting hand tool must monitor the fire at all times.

CATEGORY 3 FIRE:

- Any fire larger than 2 metres high by 3 metres wide 3 or more concurrently burning piles no larger than 2 metres high by 3 metres wide
- 1 or more burning windrows Stubble or grass burning over an area greater than 0.2 hectares

REGULATIONS:



A fuel break must be established around any Category 3 burn area.



Monitor your open burn to ensure that the fire doesn't spread beyond its intended size.



You must have a burn registration number to light a Category 3 open fire. Call the burn registration line 1 888 797-1717 to obtain one.

GENERAL REGULATIONS:



strong wind conditions.



Your fire must be extinguished before extinguished be leaving the area.



Always keep your fire a safe distance away from nearby branches, wood and other combustible materials.



Do not conduct Category 2 or Category 3 burns when venting conditions are "Poor" or "Fair". Always check here first: www.bcairquality.ca/ readings/ventilation-index.html

Arryone found in contravention of an open fire prohibition may be fined up to \$1,150. If your fire escapes and results in a wildline, you may be fined arrywhere from \$100,000 to \$1 million and be sentenced to one year in prison. Please check with local government authorities for any other restrictions before lighting any open fire.
