



STORIES OF HOMES IN UNION BAY cont'd:

The two homes north of the Post Office were built at different times, over 20 years apart. About 1911 the house next to the Gaolhouse museum was built for the Coal Company's Master Mechanic, at the time Andrew Pollock. He was from Scotland where he had trained.



This was a large rectangular house bigger than most homes in the Bay at that time. It consisted of a large living room with windows overlooking the water, and behind that a dining room, both with coal burning fireplaces. The kitchen was at the back with a door to the garden and garage. The front door led up to a long hall, wide enough to have a piano along one wall. Three bedrooms and a bathroom led off the hall.

In the early 30's Bill Auchinvole, son of the Manager, became Master Mechanic and moved into the home with his wife Thelma and daughters Margot and Heather. They were a very social couple who entertained often and generously supported everything happening in the community. Bill supported sports and Thelma provided beautiful linen, silver and flower arrangements for weddings and special events. She also supported the Red Cross with her knitting and sewing through WW11.

While they were living there a dining nook was added to the kitchen and a den. A wide veranda stretched along the back facing the lawn and vegetable garden, tended by Dick, a friendly Chinese fellow, who grew giant vegetables and fruits, many of which Thelma canned and jammed. As well, an adorable playhouse was built for the girls, where many of their friends spent happy times playing house.

Percy Renwick, son of early settlers, studied and became assistant Customs Man to Seymour Abrams in Union Bay. Elizabeth Walker, a young lass recently from Aberdeen Scotland, came to live with her step sister, Mrs. Emdy. Elizabeth procured a job as chambermaid at the Nelson Hotel where one day, while sweeping the porch, Percy Renwick, a handsome man in the uniform of a Customs Man, appeared and stole her heart. They were married in the early 20's and first lived in a small house on Washer Creek Hill. With their growing family of three boys, Kenneth, Donald and Jack, they had outgrown the first house so bought property on the highway where they built a large house. Besides three bedrooms up and two down, the very social couple specified that the house must have a large living room. Over the years the grand living room was put to good use for get-togethers, parties, showers, card games, 58 ladies at a costume party, etc.

As Percy was Customs Man, many officers from ships that called were entertained. Especially during WW11, people gathered for a good time, singing the latest tunes with friend Kathleen Stubbs playing the piano. The couple were heavily involved in building the Community Hall, which opened in May 1942 to an inaugural banquet. Percy was Secretary-Treasurer for many years and Elizabeth led the Ladies committee, making sandwiches for the Saturday dances.

Elizabeth lived on in the big house many years after Percy's death. With her wonderful sense of humour, she entertained friends and lived to be100.

UNION BAY GARDENERS

We are a small group of volunteers who maintain the Boulevard Gardens along the Coastal Highway. These gardens stretch from south of McLeod to the Old School with parts in front of Union Bay Market and Union Bay Automotive.

The group meets on the second Tuesday every month (March – October) at 9.00 a.m. for a couple of hours. Timing is fairly flexible with gardeners often setting their own work. We have further improved flexibility by having some club members adopt their own garden beds which now stands at about 55%. "The Boat Ramp Crew" works cooperatively with us to look after the grass cutting, fertilizing etc. Currently we have an automated sprinkler system in place which allows us to water every second day during the drier summer months.

We encourage any interested volunteers even if they can only spare an hour or so to work independently at any time to get in touch with us. Bring along a reflective safety vest or wear bright shirt or coat plus your own gardening tools. We have a few spare reflective vests available and cones for when working close to the highway.

In the past we have received donations from residents of Union Bay and outside areas plus businesses and governmental agencies which allows us to operate successfully. Any future donations no matter how small would be gratefully received.
