




#### EXCITING NEWS

# When times get tough, credit unions matter most

Community, connection and collaboration are principles upon which credit unions are based. The last eight months have proven just how much those co-operative values matter.

#### You can count on your credit union

Seeing a difference between banks and credit unions isn't always easy – after all, they're both financial institutions that offer standard banking services. But when the going gets tough, it's the credit unions' dedication to making local decisions, supporting neighbourhood jobs and giving back to community that sets them apart.

When faced with demanding times and tough decisions, credit unions ask, "What's the right thing to do for our members?" Banks ask, "What's the right thing to do for our bottom line?"

Like with other organizations, the pandemic has made operating a financial institution more difficult, but credit unions have persevered and are thriving because of co-operative values.

Take us, here at Union Bay Credit Union. We kept our doors open to maintain the service levels our members depend on. We completed mortgage deferrals without members waiting on the phone for hours or being turned away at the door. We continued to lend to members, prioritizing help for those struggling. We boosted community donations to non-profits in need and suspended account fees for businesses that had to close.

On the surface, credit unions and banks may look the same, but the decisions they make are completely different because of their distinct ownership structures.

As with so many, the past months have revealed our strengths.







#### STORIES OF HOMES IN UNION BAY cont'd:

By 1900 several families who worked for the company, the Drews, Cooks, Rays and Walkers had built homes on Union Coal Company land along the highway. Lindsay Ray built the 5<sup>th</sup> house (our focus today) north of the Post Office for his family.



After many explosions in the mines, the Cumberland Miners went on strike in 1912 to protest for gas safety. The workers at Union Bay went on strike to support. By September all strikers were ordered to vacate rented homes, and homes built on company land. Many, like Lindsey Ray, were forced to leave, and some lived in tents on the beach. Workers, loyal to the company, who kept on working took over the strikers' homes.

Charles Hooper, who had married Minnie Stewart in Courtenay, worked in the mines in Cumberland. In about 1900 he became Manager of the Coke ovens at Union Bay, and lived in a company house at Union Bay. After the strike the Hooper family, with seven children, took over the Ray house. Mrs. Hooper was an enterprising lady who hunted for food. She'd shoot a deer, dragged it home, skinned, butchered, and cooked it for the family. She was always stylishly dressed, as was her oldest daughter Bebe. Bebe a glamorous lady, that had married young, had three children then left her husband and returned home to live with her parents.

The British Columbia Telephone Co. had a system from Victoria to Nanaimo, and in 1909 completed 70 more miles to connect the Comox Valley. The exchange at Union Bay was put into Hooper's house with Bebe as operator. With her assistant, Evelyn Campbell, she was able to keep the exchange open 24/7. As well, there was another "pay station" at Fraser & Bishops store where the public could make calls.

The house was next door to the Auchinvoles, Manager of the Company. Hector Hooper remembers that when the Auchinvole's first washing machine was replaced it was given to Mrs. Hooper. It was the kind where you turned the lever back and forth. The kids took turns, 100 times for one load. Still an improvement over the scrubbing board!

On the north side of the Hooper home was a pretty little home named "Rose Cottage", surrounded by a beautiful garden (now a blackberry patch). It was built by Ed Drew, a German bricklayer who worked on the construction of the Coke Ovens and stayed on to do maintenance. Rose Cottage was the scene of several weddings, including the Drew's daughter Cleda. In 1895 Mrs. Drew dressed as Santa Claus at the first Christmas party held in the big boarding house, where the early settlers lived when they first arrived in Union Bay. After the Drews left, the William Marshall family moved in.

Mr. Hooper brewed his own beer. At the end of the process he thought it a shame to waste the left-over mash, so he dumped it over the fence into Mrs. Marshall's pig pen. This caused the pigs to get very drunk. Mrs. Marshall was not amused!

Later, several different families lived in "Rose Cottage". But over the years, without a proper foundation, it was always damp so in the 1960's it was abandoned and torn down.


