STORIES OF BUILDINGS IN UNION BAY: Cont.

In 1897 the coal company built the first row of cottages facing the highway. These houses were small, with just four rooms and a pantry tacked on the back. Studs were not used in their construction. Instead, the 1" X 12" shiplap was vertically



nailed on to 2" X 4" boards along the ceiling and floor. Outside, batten was put over the cracks where the shiplap met. There were no inside walls; felt paper was nailed over the shiplap and calcimined. The chimney did not go to the floor but was supported by a bracket on the wall, and had holes on two sides, one for the kitchen stove pipe and one for the living room heater. Both stoves would burn coal, but not enough warmth to heat the non-insulated homes in the cold winter. The Donaldson and Gibson families were some of the first occupants. William Marshall and family lived in the last house next to Jones Street, and next to them the Dave Renwick family.

The homes all looked across the highway to the coal loading trestle with locomotives shunting coal cars back and forth. In front of the trestle, the company hired Bob McKay with his team of horses to clear the large property for a big sports field. The cottage occupants could sit on their verandahs and watch a football or baseball game. Once a year, in the summer, all the workers and their families from Bevan and Cumberland were transported by the coal trains to Union Bay for a company picnic and sports day. A merry-go-round with horses, carved in the car shop, was set up to delight the children. Ice cream and pop was provided. Races, the three legged and sack races were enjoyed. Contests like catching the greasy pig were fun to watch or participate in.

The first house, now a vacant lot, was occupied right away and designated as the school. The B.C. government required a minimum of 15 pupils to establish a school in a community. After the Cook family of three grown sons and five young daughters arrived, the grand total of 14 children was reached. They needed one more student, so little Mary McKay, four years old, was sent; she said she slept half of the day. Miss E. Dalby took charge of the children, aged five to sixteen. The next year a young man with an MA took over. Mr. McKinnon set a high standard. At the closing exercise he took advantage of several dignitaries passing through the town: Lt. Gov. McGinnis, Post Officer Inspector Fletcher, Mayors of Victoria, and Nanaimo. They gave speeches, dwelling on the evils of the cramming system of education and the necessity of obedience to supervisors. They passed out awards to the students. After such a glorious end to the school year, the parents decided to build a real school. Then the little cottage became a home for the workers.



Beaufort Watershed Stewards: What's a nice group like you doing with a new volunteer like me?

I'm a city boy, raised in, and former resident of, a once-large city in the US rust belt. What I knew then about water was that if you turned a tap, it came out. Having aged out the work world, and having arrived here in Fanny Bay, I had enough uncommitted time on hand that I needed something more to do to engage in a meaningful life, or to at least keep out of my long-suffering wife's hair, and possibly away from our collection of household cleaners and domestic implements. Well, it came to me.volunteering.....that's the thing.

With whom? That was easy, just ask the neighbors. My local sage immediately recommended the Beaufort Watershed Stewards and gave an email and contact name. I wrote off to Mike Mesford, volunteering my services, and darn if he didn't reply right back. While just an email, I'm sure I heard patriotic and noble music playing in the background as I read it:

"Yes, Tom, we can use your help. Water is the lifeblood of our planet and ourselves. We are doing all we can to ensure our local watersheds are safe and resilient. We monitor the water flow coming down from the Beauforts and into the Sound, passing into our water systems along the way. We need to know if pollutants are leaching into our waters, if drought or floods trigger sediment flows, or threaten the aquatic life. We want to understand the risks, and plan for the future. This means we have creeks to climb, streams to wade, and measurements to take. It's into the woods we go. By the way, we always go out in pairs, for safety reasons."

Great, I thought. It's one person to go back and report the bear, and the other to serve as an appetizer while the first one gets away. Who could resist? How soon can I start?

Two days later, Mike takes me to meet my Waterloo (as it turns out, the name of one of the eleven creeks and rivers the BWS covers). We drive up a small road, which turns into a gravel path, which in turn becomes a goat trail. Throughout our increasingly bouncing journey, Mike explains to me the goals and purpose of BWS, how today's tasks work towards these objectives, and who will be carrying what into the boonies.

Here's what I take from it. Is the water shallow or deep today? Clean or dirty? With enough data points on enough days and from enough streams, we can know whether the overall water flow is drying up or threatening flood, whether natural or man-made particulates or chemicals are being introduced, whether trends suggest all is going ducky, or its time to take action.

So how did things come out? Well, you'll have to see if BWS will let me continue this saga in the next newsletter. I will say that a bear was involved. Although truth probably requires, that I also note it was a Wooly Bear caterpillar. Still, they can be dangerous.


