Doors open at 8:00 am



## Union Bay Community Club Janette Glover- Geidt

As Bill Auchinvole predicted, the Hall was a great success, especially during the war years and just after. It was enjoyed and used. It could be rented by Union Bayites for any occasion for \$7.50. The mortgage was soon paid off. Jimmy Walkers Orchestra from Courtenay played the first dance. Two of the players, Jewels Herbin on sax, and Hank Hatch on piano, made arrangements of the popular Big Band tunes, then joined with four other musicians and formed the Country Club Orchestra. Dancers from all over the Island flocked to the Saturday night dances in the new hall. The players received \$7.00 each for four hours of music. Once a month on a Friday night, Johnny Lockner's Orchestra played for an Old Time Dance. Some of the older women taught the young people the time honoured dances: the Barn Dance, Lancers, the Gay Gordons. The kids became quite addicted following Johnny around the Valley, Denman, Cape Lazo, Merville.

A very devoted Women's Committee of the club met in the afternoon of a dance and prepared the famous ham and egg sandwiches. During wartime this was a feat, as many items were rationed including coffee, sugar and butter. Elizabeth Renwick and Ella Davis went early and by adding gelatin and milk to one pound of butter it could be beaten, with a spatula, into two pounds. They joked that the spatulas were worn down by the beating, and because they were made of rubber, during the war a new one couldn't be bought so the old ones had to be used. The ladies, all mothers, kept busy by forming the Merchant Navy Club. During the war many Merchant Marine ships called with men from around the world, all missing home. So a club room was built in the basement of the Hall, furnished with comfortable chairs, board games and magazines for the Sailors to enjoy. For each ship that came for coal, the ladies provided some kind of entertainment in the big hall perhaps home slides, a dance, a concert. Anyone with a bit of talent was called upon. Often the men entered into the fun. With a song, a Maori crew sang "Now is the Hour when we must say good-bye", a real tear jerker. An Irish step dancer brought his tap shoes, an organist from a big church in England played the piano. All were made special and treated to coffee, some home baking, or whatever was on offer, even strawberries and cream. The popular dances continued into the late fifties. The hall was marked for three badminton courts; basketball hoops were installed along with gymnasium rings, ropes and bars. Everything was well-used, especially by the Athletic Club.

By the late 1960's Weldwood had purchased the Coal company, and wanted the triangle of land that the Hall sat on returned to complete their plot, so offered the Community Club the land where the now demolished Chinatown sat. An offer too good to miss. But how to move such a huge building? There was no Nickel Bros. then. Up stepped Ed Sawchuck who said he could do it. The bets were on and a large crowd gathered to see if Eddy could deliver. He prepared by cutting off part of the dining room, and putting long girders under the main hall. With two logging trucks he pulled it through the old ball field, along the beach side of the highway, then across the road to its resting place in old Chinatown while the crowd cheered.



# Union Bay Fire Rescue Supporting Safe Burning Practices

#### **Fire Permits**

Fire permits help keep the department informed about burning activities. A fire permit details safe burning practices that can help reduce property damage, personal injury and wildfires.

Fire Permits are required April 1 to Oct 31 for all open burning in the Union Bay fire protection area, except for campfires.

Large, machine piled, industrial Category 3 burns require permits year-round.

## **Getting a Permit**

Fire permits are free of charge and can be completed online. The online application is available on the fire department webpage <a href="https://www.unionbayfirerescue.ca">www.unionbayfirerescue.ca</a>. A printable PDF version is also available on the website or completed in person at the fire department (by appointment).

#### **Permit Cancellations**

If fire hazards change in the area, fire permits may be cancelled. Permit holders will need to check the Union Bay Fire Rescue website prior to burning to ensure that fire bans are not in effect and that conditions are right for burning.





## **CVRD Director Update**

Thanks to Brenda Bitten for inviting me to write a little update for "Down by the Bay". I am happy to report that there is renewed optimism at local government as we emerge out of the time-warp of the last two years. As with other sectors, the pandemic was disruptive at the CVRD, but we managed to keep advancing key initiatives for Union Bay. While I could go on at length on the topics below, I thought I would do flash updates on a few key Union Bay projects... don't hesitate to reach out to me if you want more information on any of these:



- 1) Last year we introduced a new **Communities Facilities Service that** aims to provide better and predictable financial supports to rural Halls. Thank you to the Union Bay Community Club for all their work, and conversations are ongoing on how the CVRD will best support capital needs in the future.
- 2) Development opportunities and pressures in Union Bay are truly unique in the CVRD. The last couple of years Union Bay Estates has invested tremendously in developing their lands, and our planning and engineering team has been working along to advance the various clauses in the Master Development Agreement. The Advisory Planning Commission for Area A recently reviewed design elements of the first subdivision and provided constructive and positive feedback, which led to a positive CVRD Board resolution.
- 3) Meanwhile, in April and May we will come back to the community (again!) to present details of the opportunity around **community sewage**. While construction costs are up everywhere, since the last election I have been committed to put forward the best proposal possible for community sewage for Royston and Union Bay, and I believe we have the right approach in partnership with the municipalities, K'omoks First Nation, and Union Bay Estates as contributing partners. I look forward to the engagement sessions and your feedback over the next couple months.
- 4) Another significant initiative has been the transition of the **Union Bay Improvement District** to the CVRD. 9 months in, things are going well. We are adding washrooms at the Treatment Plant, and will decommission the old site as well in the fall. A water master plan is also being completed, which will inform rates for the long-term. Based on your feedback, I also asked that we do a full review of the rate structure and simplify it. Happy to report this will happen over the next few months.
- 5) As part of **Parks and Active Transportation** planning, there is a lot to do in Union Bay over the coming years, in my opinion. Some land transfers for parks are expected from Union Bay Estates, but we also put a project on the map to look at improving the waterfront on the other side of the highway. This would require grant funding and partnership with the Ministry of Transport, but the initiative is now part of our regional plan priorities.
- 6) Another initiative I have been working on is to explore the potential for a new **library branch** for Union Bay. As I am on the executive of the Vancouver Island Regional Library, I have learned that we have the smallest branch of any out there, and that indeed the organization could invest to build a new facility in Union Bay.... so far our Executive Director has connected with SD71 to have conversations about the old school site. Fingers crossed!

There is a lot more of course, but hopefully this gives you a glimpse of our work. I really enjoy working for Union Bay, and welcome your suggestions and feedback. Enjoy the spring and hopefully see some of you around in person!
