Union Bay Fire Rescue would like to extend a big THANK YOU to the residences of Union Bay. Over 31 homes participated in the inaugural curbside chipper program with over 50 cubic yards of debris being removed to the CVRD Skyrocket facility. This is an outstanding step towards fire prevention.

The goal of the Union Bay Fire Rescue / Comox Valley Regional District chipping program is to provide Union Bay with solutions to deal with woody shrubs, windfall branches and limbs up to 18 inches in diameter by 30 feet. By reducing the need for burning, air quality is preserved and the potential risk of other accidental fires is decreased.

As well, the department would like to acknowledge the outstanding service provided by Above and Beyond Tree Service – this year's successful contractor. Chad's team was acknowledged by numerous participants regarding their efficiency.

Union Bay Fire Rescue is looking forward to working with the Comox Valley Regional District to continue this fire safety initiative next year.



Stories of Properties in Union Bay cont.

Continuing north on the top side of the Highway. In the 60's a beautiful log house was built by Gordon Clark. His wife Wilma was a wonderful cook who made and sold her tasty bread and buns from her house. Further along, Dave and Shirley McKay built the unique log and cement house next to Van West logging road. The construction was of

blocks of logs cut in rounds then cemented together with the end grain exposed. An interesting look which created a great deal of interest from passers-by.

The McKay's first lived across the logging road in a small house which Ingles Dalziel had put on skids on Denman Island and floated across Baynes Sound, where it was put on Baikie Logging's property. Later, the Dalziel's built a larger house beside it.

Across the highway is Glover Road, at the bottom of which is Spence Road. The large property from the highway to the beach was originally pre-empted by Adam Bruce and logged in the 1800s. He farmed the southern section next to the Colliery property. Sam McLeod of Comox bought this large piece of land, subdivided the north half and put in the road called Spence in the late 1930's, where the first homes were built. In the 40's Harry and Ray Glover bought the south half and put in a road continuing Spence. They subdivided the beach side where Harry and Winnie Glover built on the first lot at the bottom of Glover Road. Ray had a beach cabin on the next lot.

In 1993 the property owners, after digging many dry or salt wells, applied to the Canadian Colliery who agreed to have their water line extend north. About seven families formed the Union Bay Water Association which was connected to the Bay water system at the weigh scales. Paul Bohn used his equipment to dig the ditch in lieu of paying his share of the total \$3,516.24. The men laid the pipes and the women helped fill in the ditch. So, everyone greatly appreciated the water when it was turned on. When the company closed in 1960 it sold the whole water system to the newly formed Union Bay Water Board for \$1.00.

In 1990 seven acres of land bounded by Glover Road and Spence Road was donated by Harry and Winnie Glover to the Regional District for a park. The Glover Park Association was in charge of the development and care of the Park. These volunteers built and maintained the paths, built benches and kept it up for about 15 years at which time it was turned over to the Regional District for maintenance.



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June was a routine month. We did our usual sampling, visiting all our creeks every other week. We retrieved level data from various wells and checked the conductivity of the water in each one. We had sub-committee meetings and moved administrative projects along. We sorted some refundables. All very routine.

The ups and downs caused by intermittent rain have mostly subsided and the creeks have settled into the long slow decline of summer. This is the best time to get a mid-range

measurement. Again, routine for this time of year. The path into the Mud Bay Creek transect site, just tens of metres off the old highway, is lush with new growth but someone has done some pruning. It's a pleasant walk now rather than the usual battle against sticker and branch. Waterloo Creek is the same as ever but has sprouted a new, makeshift tent. We apologized to the temporary resident as we skirted the camp on our way in to the transect site. Cook Creek, with its uniform depth and wide, level bottom, is always an easy transect. Wilfred, however, is still a roaring torrent. Its headwaters are higher than our other creeks and it's still being fed by melting snow. We decided to wait until it's a bit lower before venturing into the maelstrom. Rosewall, too, was running high but it seemed approachable. This was our first time taking a transect at Rosewall. The flow was swift and at times our wading rod vibrated madly as the water piled up behind it. The creek bottom was uneven with large rocks. We moved deliberately and methodically and managed to get our transect without incident. Cowie, the last of our creeks with a gauging station, was not overly high. But the bottom is particularly treacherous. Large slabs of limestone, slippery with growth, tilt at odd angles with sudden gaping holes that can cause a stumble and a dip. So, we now wear wetsuits in Cowie and have a team of at least three people.

All of these routine activities are at the core of who we are. But it's always fun to have some variety. The very exciting, non-routine news from June is the activity we have planned for July. We just received confirmation from the University of Victoria that our resistivity project is going forward again this year. Last year, we used the technique in nine different locations from Royston to Fanny Bay. The goal was to confirm that this technique would be useful for measuring subsurface geological features (for example, aquifer boundaries). When the data were analyzed, the results confirmed that the technique works well in this area. So, the plan for July is to take fifty percent more measurements than last year. Yes, routines are comforting but variety is the spice of life!







# FireSmart™ Program Helps Protect Your Home

Forest fires are a natural part of our ecosystem, and we're learning that we can't eliminate them. However, we can reduce the risk of losing our buildings and properties in a wildfire event.

FireSmart is a community based program that provides information, education and activities that increases a community's resilience to wildfire and reduces the risk of wildfire. For a free FireSmart evaluation call your local fire department.

#### FireSmart Tips For Your Home



Have a wildfire evacuation plan and make sure everyone in your household knows what to do.



Hold sheds and other structures to the same standards as your home.



A mowed lawn is a fire-resistant lawn. Grasses shorter than 10 centimetres in height are less likely to burn intensely.



Relocate propane tanks 10 - 30 metres from your home, and keep combustible vegetation a minimum of 10 metres from propane tanks.



Clean and maintain gutters and roofs. Keep decks and balconies clear of leaves and debris.



Move firewood and lumber 10-30 metres away from home.



Clean under your deck to remove any combustible material. Establish a 1.5 metre non-combustible zone around the perimeter of the house and deck.



FireSmart doesn't mean that your trees have to be cut down. Keeping them spaced and pruned is often sufficient.



Add non-combustible 3 millimetre screens to external vents (except dryer vents).



Reduce the flammability of your landscaping and plant wildfire resistant vegetation.
