CONFECTIONERIES:

The early settlers of Union Bay had little money to spend, but for a treat, only a few places to spend a penny or nickel. The first to take advantage of this was the Nelson Cook family who lived three doors north of the Post Office. Dora baked tasty pastries; Nelson kept cows and from the rich cream made ice cream, the first in town. By cutting big blocks of ice from frozen lakes or ponds and storing it under sawdust, ice could be kept until summer. About 1909 the Pilsener Beer company installed an ice manufacturing machine at Cumberland, so ice was available. Mr. Cook built a little roadside stand by the gate from where the confections were sold.


The first actual confectionery was built on the beach across from the school. It was built by Hilda Anderson, a little Swedish lady who could not read or write English. This did not stop her from being a very good businesswoman with a shrewd eye for figures. The tiny lady was always immaculately dressed in a long black dress, covered with a beautifully embroidered apron. On her petite feet were shiny, black button boots. The Confectionery was well-stocked with peppermint candies, strawberry and wintergreen sticks, toffees, chocolates, and chewing gum, all displayed in tall glass bottles. Mrs. Anderson proudly declared in her Swedish accent that she sold "yiclets, yoclates and yewing gum. She was known as "Mrs. Yee whiz", this being her favourite expression. As well as selling candies, she sold cinnamon buns and coffee cakes to go with her coffee. She bought select coffee beans, roasted them in her oven, then ground them and brewed exquisite aromatic coffee. Mrs. Anderson also kept punch boards. The punch board was about 8"x10"x1/2" thick. It was full of little holes covered with a piece of paper. In each hole was a tiny piece of paper with a number on it which corresponded to an index of prizes which numbered each hole. For five or ten cents you'd take a wire pin and shove it in a hole. If you matched the right hole you won, maybe a trinket, a kewpie doll or a big box of chocolates.


When Butcher Bowden moved to town with his wife and family, he built a little house on the beach across from the Wilson Hotel, with an Ice Cream Parlour on the front. It was a quaint little parlour with white washed walls and lace curtains in the windows. Bent cane chairs surrounded four tables. Cherry, pineapple, butterscotch, strawberry and maple walnut sundaes, as well as banana splits, were served in heavy glass dishes. Mrs. Bowden made her own ice cream: into the wooden stave barrel went the ice chips and rock salt, then a five-gallon metal pail fitted into the ice. Thick cream, sugar, and vanilla were poured in, paddle and handle secured, and the kids took turns cranking the handle until the ice cream froze.

In the 1930's Nell Hudson, whose husband Tom had died, had son Reg move their house closer to the highway, and made the front parlour into a corner store and confectionery. It had four stools at the ice cream bar in front of the freezer which held four different flavours of Palm Dairy Ice cream. She bought a milkshake machine and whipped up frothy milkshakes with vanilla, strawberry, butterscotch, or chocolate syrup. Eight ounces of pop were drunk from the bottle with a waxed paper straw. Floats were popular, made with a scoop of ice cream floating in a tall glass of Hires root beer, Coca Cola or Rummings orange crush.

Art and Jessie Hastings bought Anderson's business and ran it until 1947 when the new highway was put in. The building was moved across the street and now sits behind the new garage which they built with a little café on the north end called the Autograph. Jesse sold light lunches and was kept busy selling candies and pop to the school kids.

When the butcher shop on the end of Fraser and Horne's was vacated, Alma Muschamp, with a few renovations, fresh paint, installation of a soda fountain, table and chairs, opened a coffee shop. It was a gathering place for young and old who all enjoyed her hearty sandwiches and delicious pies.





Beaufort Watershed Stewards (BWS)



The forecast called for sun but there was a drizzle of rain on the windshield as we drove the short distance to Mud Bay Creek. We hoped to do a transect – that is, measure the stream flow – before the Fanny Bay Salmonid Enhancement folks installed their smolt trap. The smolt trap, appropriately enough, catches smolts, or baby fish, so they can be counted as they head out to sea. The problem for BWS is that the smolt trap raises the water level. Since we use the level as an indicator of how much water is flowing, anything that artificially raises the

water level confuses our data. So, we try to get a transect just before and just after the smolt trap goes in and then we adjust the numbers accordingly.

We start by recording the stage, the hydrological term for water level. Then we string a measuring tape across the creek and begin taking readings at regular intervals perpendicular to the flow. While we are doing our prep work, the sun breaks through the drizzle and, even though we're in the trees, stray sunbeams find us through the leaves. They carry some psychological warmth even if no real heat. The woods are full of robins, flitting from tree to tree, arguing over territory with their complex melodies. Our sophisticated instrument, the Flow Tracker II, does all the thinking so we settle into a routine, enjoying the morning and swapping stories.

My transecting partner, Paul Anders, is a former teacher. His school used to incubate salmon eggs in a large

tank in the school's main hallway. The kids tracked the water temperature in the tank and watched for changes to the eggs over the course of the winter. In the spring, the kids took the newly hatched fry to Rosewall Creek. It was an exciting event for the kids, carrying their "pets" to the creek in buckets. They poked them, talked to them, and named them as they released them into pools along the creek bank. The kids watched as the fish skittered about, cautiously exploring their new, more expansive home.

Then thwack! Imagine the children's horror as a huge brown trout darted out from under a log and, in a flash, gobbled up half of the little fish. A fun day ended with a hard lesson. Nature can be a merciless tutor!

Our transect is finished and we begin packing up. Nature is kind today and has nothing to teach us except that it feels good to be in the creek, in the dappled sunlight, after a long winter.






