# Historical Society Est. 1989

#### **EARLY COMMERCE in UNION BAY.**

George Howe, who built and owned the Nelson Hotel and first little store on the beach, had taken Jack Fraser as a partner. About 1905 they decided to build a large store at the north corner of McLeod Road and the Island Highway. Soon after, Mr. Howe retired to his farm on Hornby Island, and sold out to Charles Bishop, a businessman from Victoria. Jack Fraser was now senior partner in the firm.

The big two storey building was 120 feet deep and 40 feet wide. At the front, two small additions were added: on the north side a butcher shop and on the south a Post Office with real boxes. Four large windows at the front displayed the latest fashions. Stairs at the back took you to the second floor, which was divided into hotel rooms used when there was an overflow at the Nelson House.

The tall facade advertised "FRASER & BISHOP" GENERAL SHIPPING MERCHANDISE & SUPPLIES

Steps from the road led to a wide wooden veranda across the front of the building. Upon entering the large double-doors, the length of the store was before you with three long aisles between counters neatly arranged with merchandise. Many items were displayed on the walls, with a tall ladder to fetch them down for a customer. There were building materials and tools, kitchen utensils, clothes, shoes, hats, yardage, everything like a small department store.

The store had a huge array of products. Beside the food staples like flour and sugar, there were fresh dairy products, meats, fruits and vegetables, all produced on their own farm behind the store, which ran from the school to McLeod Road. Hungo, a robust Chinese man, kept the farm with a huge garden, large barn for the animals, water tower, and slaughter house. Hungo always had a pocket of hard barley sugar candies for the children who visited the barn to play with the kittens. He lived in Chinatown and went back and forth on his bicycle with a bulb horn mounted on the handlebar. The kids would call to him "Toot your horn Hungo". He always responded with a beep. Extra cattle were kept, running wild, at Henry Bay on Denman Island. It was Hungo's job to round them up, put them on a scow and bring them to the Bay to be slaughtered then sold.

The store also catered to the many ships that called for coal. Huge orders of meat and groceries were ordered ahead, to be ready when the ship docked.

In 1917 Mr.Bishop, a natty dresser, described by some as a "cranky rich gentleman", sold his interest to Alf Horne and the firm became Fraser & Horne. Mr. Horne was a quiet man with a good sense of humour. He loved children and always gave them a treat, the gooier the better, to watch the Mother's reaction as the kids made a mess. Mr. Fraser was a very benevolent man. Most of the housewives ran a running tab which they paid at the end of the month and were rewarded with a "gin-up, a bag of fruit and candy. If a family was struggling he gave them more time. It was said that he had two cigar boxes full of unpaid accounts and bad cheques.

For many years George Harwood ran the butcher shop at the north end. When the new Post Office was built in 1913, the room at the south end was used as an office, with a safe, filing cabinet and desk, a home for the bookkeeper. Several men and women filled this position, the longest being Laura Little, a widow who had worked for Simon Leiser in Cumberland. Once a week, Mrs. Little would take her order book and walk around the village, taking orders from housewives and often stopping for a cup of tea. The next day the delivery man brought the groceries.

After living in Union Bay for over 40 years, Jack Fraser died of a heart attack in 1935. Alf Horne was left sole owner of the store, but in 1937 he died while delivering groceries. Mrs. Horne, with son Gordon's help, proved a capable business woman. In 1948 they built a new store. The old building was sold to Sydney Ryall and run by Edna Peters. The store was torn down in the 70's.
