
laugh. A lot! And, oh, those stories!

But most importantly, for us, is her impressive and vital work with BWS. She is the BWS treasurer and helped us navigate the crazy amount of bureaucracy needed to achieve charitable status. She has been instrumental in developing our five-year plan, another step towards financial responsibility. She runs the South Pod stream sampling program (6 streams from the Tsable River to Mud Bay Creek), she is second-in-command of the Refundables Program, the major BWS revenue stream, and she is a valued member of too many committees to count. Some say that without her, BWS wouldn't exist. It is certainly true to say that without her we would be a much lesser organization. And as if all that weren't enough, she's a constant source of entertainment!







The donation will go towards purchasing new medical equipment for our First Responders. Thank You!








Union Bay Coal Warf

Opened in 1889, the wharves were the largest constructed in BC. At the 490-metre (1,600 ft) principal wharf, four colliers could be loaded simultaneously. The other wharf handled general freight, and coal if required. In due course, the Dunsmuir's had their own fleet transporting coal to San Francisco. In 1910, Sir William Mackenzie purchased all the Dunsmuir mines through his Canadian Collieries (Dunsmuir). During the two world wars Union Bay made a significant contribution in supplying fuel for allied freighters. Throughout the decades, the port was known for its warmth and hospitality. Blue Funnel Line steamers regularly

called to replenish their coal. The final sailing ship to call and load coal was the *Pamir* in 1946. The final freighter was the M.S. *Hikawa Maru* in 1951, but coal barges continued calling during that decade.

Owned by Weldwood, the long abandoned coal wharf, with trees protruding through the trestle deck, was demolished in 1966.



Roy Storey: Oct 1931 - May 2023


Roy was a very dedicated volunteer. He was a familiar face in our community after years of being on the boat ramp committee, beatification committee, a UBCC board member and fundraising for events. He played the music and emceed for many Bay Days. Roy found a love for performing and was an active member of local drama and choral groups. He was always willing to roll up his sleeves and be an active participant, all while sharing stories and wisdom. Roy's life was enriched by the friendship of many and he will be greatly missed.
