Here are some fun facts about April you probably didn't know



Did you ever wonder how April Fool's Day started? It is speculated that the custom of April Fools began in France during the 16th century, after the New year calendar was moved from April 1st to January 1st. Those who continued to celebrate the April new year were considered fools, and often the victims of practical jokes. Today we just like to have a little fun with our friends!

- If you were born in April, your zodiac sign is either Aries or Taurus.
- April has two birth flowers. Both the daisy and the sweet pea are considered birth flowers for the month of April. The sweet pea signifies blissful pleasure, while daisies represent childhood innocence, loyalty, and purity. The birthstone is diamond.
- For our friends in the Southern Hemisphere, April is the seasonal equivalent to October

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Qualicum Tom and Annie:

Dogfish oil had long been used in the woods. Qualicum Tom was one of the earliest processors. He extracted the oil in a crude little refinery at his home on the Big Qualicum River, where spawning fish were plentiful. With his horse and wagon he travelled up Island and sold the oil to Logging camps, at 50c per gallon. It was mainly used as a lubricant on the skids to make the logs slip easily when the oxen pulled them to the booming ground.

At the end of the 1800's, the mail wagon travelled from Nanaimo to the Comox Valley on a poorly made trail with no bridges, so they had to ford the creeks and rivers. When the Big Qualicum was high, the driver hired Tom to row him and the mail across, while the horse swam the river.

Qualicum Tom was probably the first travelling salesman to come to Union Bay. He lived with his wife Annie in a log house at the mouth of the Big Qualicum River. They tended a large orchard which provided them with lots of apples, cherries, plums, and pears to sell. They always had something to trade or sell if not fruit, smoked fish or live chicken.

Tom was a big man, well over 300#, with arms that reached down to his knees. Annie was a roly-poly. Whenever the couple felt the urge to 'go on a toot', they loaded the wagon and headed to Union Bay. They were gentle-people who loved nothing better than to come to town for a visit. They stopped and talked to everyone, and Tom did like to talk in a slow and deliberate way. Annie sat patiently listening until she could bear it no longer and would lean across him and say, 'Let me talk for a while, Tom'. Annie particularly liked to stop at the Post Office to visit Post Master Brown's wife for a chat and tea. Mrs. Brown's father, Adam Grant Horne, was a Hudson Bay factor and was posted to many spots, including Comox, where his children played with the native children and learned to speak Chinook.

They stopped at Fraser and Bishop's and visited with everyone. Bob McKay remembers: "Jack Fraser used to give me a bottle of whiskey and say, 'Put this in the back of their wagon'. Tom would say, 'I didn't see a thing'. A few yards down the road out would come the bottle and they would start celebrating and singing, as they went down the road. One time the horse and wagon went off the road and over the bank. They were found under the overturned wagon, happy as clams. Sometimes if the weather was poor, they stayed the night at the Muschamp farm where Tom always saved a drink for his friend, Alf Walker, who also spoke Chinook. Occasionally the couple made the long trip to Courtenay. On one trip the they stopped at McQuillan's livery stable where they admired the latest buggie, glistening and shining, waiting to be hired by businessmen or dandies. Tom couldn't resist it and rented the carriage to take Annie for a ride. Just then Cuddy Johnson, owner of the Courtenay Hotel, came in wanting to rent it but Bob McQuillan said "Sorry, first come first served".


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Kids Parade on Bay Day

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

CVRD 2024 BUDGET FOR UNION BAY By Daniel Arbour (Area A Director)

- a) Water rates are increasing as we implement the asset management plan for water pipes, as I discussed last year.
- b) The sewage project continues to advance. Currently there are no tax increases for this project but obviously if the project proceeds there will be significant increases to pay for the resident's portion. Thank you to all residents who have engaged in this process over the past year.
- c) Some great news the CVRD Rural Areas Committee agreed to fund up to \$290,000 towards the renewal of the Playground at the Union Bay Hall and a better connection to Tappen Street! Thanks so much to UBCC and the playground committee for the excellent work this past year! This will have zero tax impact as we were able to assemble our contribution through existing available dollars.
- d) Firehall planning is advancing with possible build in 2025/2026. Projected costs will be updated and presented to the community this coming year.





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
