I am allergic to fish. My Norwegian grandfather found this confusing. He didn't understand how anyone could live without eating fish. My father used to take me salmon fishing in his little boat, out in the sound, but I never caught anything other than dogfish. I think the salmon knew I wouldn't be able to eat them anyway.

BWS is not a fish-centric organization. Fanny Bay Salmonid Enhancement Society has that realm covered admirably. We are focussed on water quality and quantity. We are, of course, fully aware of the overlap between fish-sustaining water and human-sustaining water. But given that I spend a lot of time dangling probes in fish-bearing creeks, it's not surprising that I get asked questions about fish. And my friends are surprised when I have no answers.

So, I decided to educate myself. Maybe some of you will also appreciate a quick primer on local salmonids. First, there are trout and there are salmon and they are both salmonids. In general, trout spend their entire lives in fresh water. Salmon spend much of their lives in salt water but need to return to fresh water to spawn. Spawning is the term used for how fish procreate. Spawning involves the female building a nest (called a redd) by thrashing around on the stream bottom until she has mounded up a pile of stones and gravel. Cozy! Then she releases eggs into the water above the redd and goes off to contemplate her life, soon to be eaten by a bear, mink, otter, or eagle. The male, meanwhile, releases sperm in the general vicinity of the redd and then goes off to a similar fate. So, they manage to reproduce without actually touching. Perhaps this is the origin of the term "cold fish" when referring to a passionless person.

Now, the fertilized eggs tucked safely in the crevasses of their rock nest spend the winter developing. In the spring they hatch becoming alevins. These are baby fish with the yolk of the egg still attached. As they grow the yolk sac is absorbed. When they have used up this reservoir of nutrients, they swim to the surface where they fill their swim bladder with air and begin to feed. They are now called fry.

If the fry are Pinks or Chum (two distinct species of salmon), they point their noses upstream and let the current take them, tail-first, downstream. They don't hang around. On the other hand, Coho, another salmon species, may stay in fresh water for over a year. If you see small fish swimming around in our creeks, they're almost certainly Coho.

We only see full-grown fish in late summer or fall. Pinks head up the creeks as soon as there is enough water. The timing depends on seasonal rainfall. They spend eighteen months in the ocean, no more, no less. The larger Chum arrive around the same time but they spend as many as five years in the briny sea. Like the Pinks, the Coho spend around eighteen months in the ocean but they leave later so they arrive later. It's easy to know when the Coho are here because Little Bay is suddenly filled with people in small boats or chest waders wielding fly rods.

When we're out and about in the fall, when the creeks are full of returning salmon, this is the time we are the most vigilant about bears. Bears depend on the oily, nutritious salmon flesh to get them through the winter. They prowl the banks scooping out live fish and scavenging dead fish. We make lots of noise approaching a stream to announce our presence. It may be exciting to see a bear on the opposite bank but clearly, we prefer not to get too close. And since I'm on the opposite bank but clearly, we prefer not to get too close. And since I'm allergic to salmon, I'm not inclined to argue with a bear over its freshly caught fish.





CELEBRATIONS: GUY FAWKES NIGHT:

In the early years at Union Bay Hallowe'en was followed by the bigger celebration of Guy Fawkes night. The mainly British settlers brought the tradition with them.

Guy Fawkes was an English conspirator in the 17 th century "Gun Powder Plot" of 1605. The unsuccessful plot was to blow up Westminster with King James 1 and hisparliament in it. Guy Fawkes initiated the plot in retaliation for James increased persecution of the Roman Catholics in England. The plot was discovered and the conspirators found with huge barrels of explosives under the chamber floor. Convicted of high treason Guy was sentenced to be hanged, drawn and quartered. However, at his execution he died when his neck was broken as he was hanged. So forever after that on November 5 th the British people of every town celebrated the unsuccessful plot by lighting bon fires up and down the country.

This celebration was brought to Union Bay and looked forward to by everyone. The coal company had its workers build a huge bon fire at the head of the Bay. The "Fu-Fu Gang", (a crew who repaired and upgraded the wharves and railroad) piled the ties and beams into a big hollow square, about 10 by 10 feet to represent the parliament building in London. Later in the 1930's and 40's the "big boys" took a half day off school to build the fire with wood from the Colliery and beach. It was set a glow, burning high in the sky; then an effigy of Guy Fawkes was thrown in. Children brought the biggest potato that they could find and put it in at the edge of the fire, but the heat was so intense they roasted black and were hard to retrieve, but they ate them anyway, black on the outside and not quite cooked on the inside. This fueled the kid's energy as they roared around the beach playing "Hide and Seek".

The teachers always attended and led everyone in a sing-song. When Donald MacDonald was principal, it was always the highlight of the evening to sing "Old MacDonald's Farm". He even had a Ford car!

In 1942, due to war conditions in the Pacific and the possibility of a "black-out", the fires were banned, then the idea abandoned. Then in the 60's, the firemen rekindled the idea by building a bonfire and serving hot dogs and pop to youngsters who probably had no idea who Guy Fawkes was.

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Union Bay / Fanny Bay No Cost Chipping Program Nov 25 – 28 2024

Please follow the rules listed below

- No rocks, no nails, no roots (to ensure they do not damage the machinery)
- No treated lumber or construction waste.
- No bags, leaves or grass clippings. Ideally all the "butt ends" of branches facing the same way so that an entire bundle can be grabbed and fed right into the chipper.
- Tree trimming must be under 20 centimetres (8in) in diameter a 5 metres (16in) in length maximum.
- No invasive species such as Scotch Broom, English Holly, Giant Hogweed & Knotweed
- Contractor reserves the right not to pick up any pile they feel does not meet these
 rules
- Do not block traffic by piling debris on the road.
- Any debris brought to the end of the driveway after starting date may not be picked up.
- All chips must be disposed of, as the funding/grant objective is to remove wildfire fuel from the landscape.

Help us help you by marking your property with a reflective address sign

Union Bay / Fanny Bay Fire Rescue is asking residents to help make their homes easy to find. To aid with address identification, the department is excited to announce the launch of a new Reflective Address Sign program.

In an emergency, every second counts. A few minutes may be too late in a medical emergency or fire. The quicker the Department can reach your home in a crisis, the faster they can help. After nightfall or in adverse weather conditions, it can be challenging to identify a house or locate a particular driveway, especially in rural areas.

To make your home easier to find, Union Bay / Fanny Bay Fire Rescue is asking that you participate in the Reflective Address Sign program. The Program provides a prominent way of displaying your home address and helps our emergency personnel deliver the assistance needed quickly during an emergency. Used in many municipalities, these blue and white reflective markers are all the same colour and shape and are easier to see by approaching emergency responders during night hours or bad weather conditions.

Union Bay / Fanny Bay Fire Rescue will be contributing to the cost of the signs to support community participation. Residents can order a sign for \$20. Signs can be paid for in advance at Union Bay Fire Hall, located at 5471 Island Hwy S Monday to Thursday, or upon delivery if ordered via email or phone. When you order a sign, a firefighter could come to your home to determine the marker's best location if needed.


