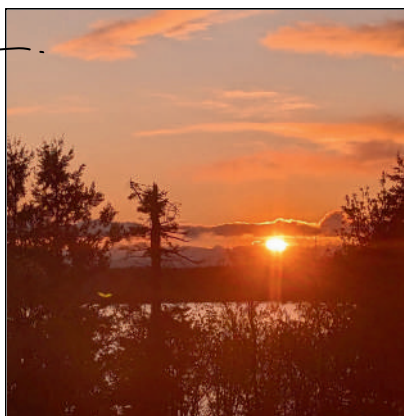

Beaufort Watershed Stewards

BWS doesn't have an office. We do our indoor stuff, like meetings and such, at each other's houses. Our monthly meetings, thanks to the kind support of SPID (Ships Point Improvement District) are at the firefighters training hall. Many meetings are on Zoom and we sometimes meet at the FBI. But if we DID have an office, it would have a big sign out front, for all to see, saying, "Stream Samplers Wanted. Apply within".

For those who have followed our adventures over the years, this request for samplers may seem odd. We have occasionally put out a call for volunteers to help with things like data management or grant writing. Finding folks who want to play in the creeks has never been a problem. Though having said that, I should note that the Royston Pod might disagree.

A 'pod' by the way, is our whimsical term for a team. As we expanded from our original three creeks, we separated the territory we now cover (Bowser to Royston) into three areas so we could be finished before dark! We sample on Tuesdays to align with the Regional District of Nanaimo (RDN) Community Watershed Monitoring protocols. And even though we refer to it as 'sampling' we don't bring samples back for analysis. We measure the Dissolved Oxygen, pH, Specific Conductivity, Temperature, and Turbidity of each creek right alongside the babbling brook itself (or crashing torrent, depending on the time of year) and record the data in a logbook.

The Royston Pod has been doing more streams, spread over a wider territory, with fewer people than the rest of us for a long time. Mostly due to the heroic commitment of Marie Purcell and Mark Lake, we have gathered unbroken reams of data from our northern realms with a skeleton crew. But things are looking up in Royston. There are now a few new bodies to share the load.

The Bowser Pod, the new kids on the block, who relied heavily on the Winter family, have recently attracted a few new folks as well. It's here in the center, in the Fanny Bay area, where we're getting thin. This is not to say we can't still get the job done. But, jeez, it seems unfair for just a few of us to hog all the fun!

So, this is your big opportunity. You may have seen our sign on the roads on most Tuesdays when the sun is shining and the birds are singing (or when it's pouring rain and the birds are home reading books by the fire). You've probably wondered what kind of fun we're having out there and how you could join in on it. Now's your chance to find out. You too can learn to wield a YSI probe and measure the Nephelometric Turbidity Units of local creeks. And learn where the Dippers do their dance and where delicate lady ferns grace exposed shale banks dripping with spring water year-round. It really is beautiful out there!

Recipe

Crunch Salad

We'll call it a salad, but it is a treat to eat. It's fresh and crunchy with hints of sweet and savoury in just the right amounts. This salad is flexible - if you don't have grapes add in more apple or more cucumber if you don't have a full bunch of celery. This is a quick salad to chop up and an easy crowd pleaser!

Ingredients:

Salad:

- 1 bunch celery, chopped (approx 10 stalks)
- 1 large honey crisp apple, diced
- 1 large cucumber, diced
- 1 cup of halved crisp grapes (red or green)
- ½ to 1 bunch fresh parsley, chopped fine
- Handful micro greens (optional)
- 8-10 pitted medjul dates, chopped
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans or walnuts

Dressing:

- 1.5 cups shaved Parmesan
- 1 bunch freshly chopped dill
- 2 -3 large lemons, juiced
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 1/4 cup avocado oil
- 1 tsp. Salt + 1 tsp pepper
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 tsp. Maple syrup (optional)

recipe adapted from Sarah Lasry by Simone & Chuck

Method:

1. Chop all salad ingredients as uniformly as possible to ensure you'll get the perfect bite of mixed elements
 2. Add all your chopped salad ingredients into a bowl
 3. Mix together all the dressing ingredients in another bowl until smooth
 4. Pour dressing over salad ingredients and toss before serving
- ~ Enjoy!

Notes:

- You can make the dressing a day or two before and store in a jar/container in the fridge.
- Once dressed this salad tastes best that day, but if you want to eat leftovers the next day stored in an air tight container in the fridge.
- The dates and pecans really elevate the salad so if you can don't skip them.
- Fresh herbs brighten the flavour, but dried dill can work in a pinch.
- Olive oil can work in place of avocado oil

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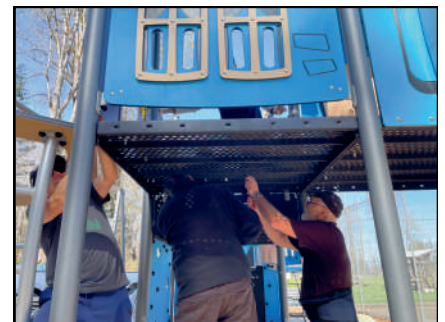
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PLAYGROUND *ready for play...again*

13. If mom had the whole day to herself what would she do?



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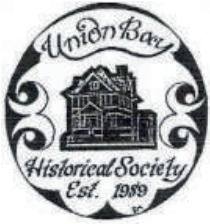
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Roads By: Janette Glover-Geidt



Before 1880 the only way to get to the Comox Valley was by water. Boats like the Cariboo Fly called infrequently to Comox, which had a government wharf. Other travelers had to meet boats out in the bay. In 1884 a buggy road was opened between Victoria and Nanaimo, and shortly after to Alberni. It was argued that Alberni had only 200 settlers compared to the Comox Valley's 2000, so a petition was sent off to Victoria demanding a road to the Valley. After the mines opened in 1889 in Cumberland, the only way to take produce from the farms in Courtenay to the miners, was to ship it by boat from Comox to the shipping wharf at Union Wharf; then, load it onto the Colliery train to Cumberland. The promised very narrow road from Courtenay to Cumberland was opened in 1891.

In 1895 the government started the road from Nanaimo to Courtenay. It allotted \$8,000 which was divided; the road being started from both ends. The project was contracted out into sections of 5 to 6 miles eg. "Union Bay to Royston". So, many men with a team of horses and tools were awarded contracts and made a bit of money.

Finally, in 1899, it was finished. Although called a road, it left much to be desired. Some rivers had not been bridged. At big Qualicum River, Qualicum Tom (first nations) operated a road house and hired out a large flat-bottomed boat to cross the river. Wagons or carriages and people were put aboard. Horses were let loose to swim, often ending up downstream, later to be rounded up and put back in harness. During winter storms many trees blew down across the road, so everyone travelled with saws and axes.

Local road foremen were hired. Alex McLeod was the first in Union Bay. With his team and wagon he filled the potholes with gravel from the beach, now called Craigdarroch. First, Second, Third and Fourth Roads went from the highway down to the beach. The beach gravel was hand-loaded onto the wagon, then spread on the road by removing one or two floor boards. Then the road was leveled by his team pulling huge scrapers. Emerson Muschamp became Road Foreman through Union Bay in the 1920's.

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Celebrating 110 years of Girl Guides in the Comox Valley

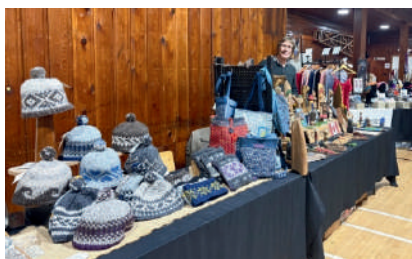
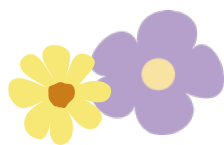
